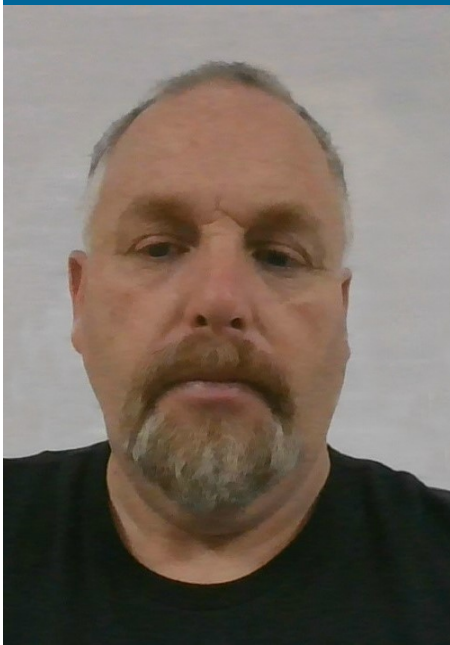

Charlottetown Pollution Control Plant (CPCP)

CPCP is a secondary activated sludge treatment plant that currently serves the majority of the City of Charlottetown, and is operated by Charlottetown Sewer & Water Utility (CS&WU). The plant includes screening, grit removal, primary clarifiers, secondary activated sludge bioreactors and clarifiers, and ultraviolet (UV) disinfection, followed by sludge processing including a biosolids pasteurization heat exchanger and anaerobic digesters, heated primarily with biogas. The plant was originally built in the early 1970's as a primary treatment plant with chlorine disinfection, and was then significantly upgraded in 2005–2006 to include secondary treatment and replace the chlorine disinfection with UV. The City of Charlottetown is planning to expand the CPCP in order to treat the wastewater from East Royalty and Stratford. There are a number of areas of the plant which need to be expanded and upgraded in order to process the increased flow and load, including the headworks, primary clarification, UV disinfection, and sludge handling. In addition, the City wishes to carry out some additional improvements to the facilities, and also wants to incorporate additional resource recovery.



Miltonvale Water Supply Project

The newly commissioned Miltonvale Water Supply Project has been designed to provide up to 80 l/s from a network of five wells. The well-field is situated on an 80 hectare parcel of land just north of the City. The supply project included 4 km of 500 mm transmission mains, two 5,000 m³ water storage reservoirs and a booster station. Two 100 kW solar PV installation are included in the project to demonstrate the use of renewable energy for water supply.

WORKSHOP TOPICS

9:30 - 10:30 AM: Choose Workshop A, B, or C

Workshop A: Pilot Monitoring for Pb in Drinking Water. The Federal-Provincial-Territorial Committee on Drinking Water (CDW) has recently proposed changes to the guideline for lead in drinking water. It is becoming evident that the CDW proposed guideline will be a significant technical and financial challenge for Canadian water suppliers. This presentation examines some of the latest information concerning lead occurrence from Canadian systems. It also presented survey data collected during a project supported by the Canadian Water Network that examines corrosion control and lead service line practices in Canada. *Presenter: Dr. Graham Gagnon. Location: Campbell, Cartier*

Workshop B: Design Benefits of Horizontal Dry-Pit Pump Stations. Horizontal Dry Pit Submersible Pump eliminates the following problems commonly seen in other pumps including: Couplings, guards, shafting, alignment and vibration leading to premature seal and bearing failure, seal water expense and maintenance of solenoid valves, strainers and flow meters. Bearing greasing and maintenance is eliminated. Flooding potential of pump room does not affect the operations of the submersible Pumps. *Presenter: Andre Velden. Location: Langevin, Tilley*

Workshop C: Cloud Services and the Internet of Things (IoT) – Basic Concepts and the Important Questions. It seems that everyone is talking about Smart Devices, the internet of things (IoT), and the Cloud. In this presentation, we break the marketing terms into what they actually mean and present simple ideas on how they work. From there, we discuss high level questions like who these products benefit, why they get so much press, and whether these devices are secure? This presentation is designed for the typical plant operator, manager, or anyone curious about Smart Devices. *Presenter: David Spencer. Location: Archibald*

Workshop D: Gate Valve Evolution and Standard. This workshop will help outline current valve standards for the most common valves found in the water distribution system. Discovery of third party organizations whom verify such material and performance specifications will be discussed. Manufacture and suppliers shall comply to these standards, however ask yourself; 'who's checking'? The answer will highlight this workshop. *Presenter: Jeff Jensen. Location: Campbell, Cartier*

Workshop E: Variable Speed Drives – Controlling Centrifugal Pumps, Saving Energy. What is a VFD and how can it save you money while increasing the performance of your system? Using variable speed control in Centrifugal pump application. *Presenter: Dave Galbraith, CSP. Location: Archibald*

Workshop F: Pompes d'eaux Usées avec Intelligence Intégrée. (Français). Workshop G: *Health Canada Changes for Lead, Manganese and Microcystin in Drinking Water.* This session will review Health Canada's proposed changes to the health-based maximum acceptable concentration of lead, the introduction of a health-based guideline for manganese and the changes in monitoring for cyanobacterial toxins. More specifically, this session will provide an overview of the key messages in the accompanying Health Canada technical documents including the rationale for the guideline change, exposure pathways and health impacts and recommended monitoring. *Presenter: Krysta Montreuil, NSE. Location: Langevin, Tilley*

Workshop H: *Workshop H: Preventing Water Infiltration – Without Digging.* Stopping infiltration using urethane grouts and CIPP Trenchless spot repair will: save money and time; train in house municipal crews or contractors; minimize equipment requirements; provide for the repair of laterals and mains in less than one day; be compatible with any type of pipe; and meets ASTM standards. *Presenter: Anthony Pizzi. Location: Campbell, Cartier*

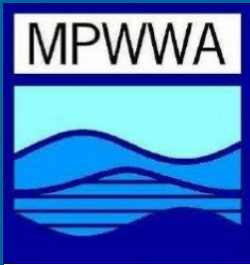
Workshop I: *Metrology – Measurement Methods Discussion.* The Canadian water metrology market has seen a great deal of advancement in recent years. Utilities now have the option to choose from many different technologies for billing measurements. This presentation will provide a high level discussion on the different metrology methods available on the market and some of the advantages and limitations of each. *Presenter: Ben Van Meirlo. Location: Archibald*

Workshop J: *Municipal Water Supplies for Public and Private Fire Protection - The 5 W's Regarding Water Flow Testing of Fire Hydrants.* The 5 W's Regarding Water Flow Testings of Fire Hydrants. This workshop provides a simple walk through regarding the steps involved in the process of setting up, conducting and processing the information for a host of different services i.e. Consultants, Fire Departments, Insurance Industry, Sprinkler System Designers and the different needs for the information and its value to a host of services. The 5 W's are of course Who, What, When, Where and Why. The presentation is made up of a combination of life experiences, photos and videos in a Power Point format, as well as Questions and Answers. *Presenter: Jim Maker. Location: Archibald*

Workshop K: *Achieving Nutrient Limits and Capacity Expansion with High Rate Treatment.* Ballasting mixed liquor can greatly increase the clarification capacity of an existing systems, thus creating a high-rate clarifier. The focus of this presentation is to present data on how these systems can increase flow 2-3X and loadings to a facility to meet high water quality without filtration or expansion. *Presenter: Jared Alder. Location: Campbell, Cartier*

Workshop L: *Contractor Safety and Auditing.* This session will explain an MPWWA member's internal employer/contractor audit process which supports their safety management system and will include: What approach did we take? What worked well? What challenges did we encounter? What key elements and key metrics were developed? The results and best practices will be discussed and shared with conference participants. Since safety management systems for contractors and employees are necessary for MPWWA members, this session will highlight an MPWWA member's continuous improvement process, beginning with the planning stages and including the follow up to ensure effective implementation. *Presenter: Paul Cormier.
